* Getting more of the members involved in the Lodge events, degree work, mentoring, fundraising, etc. Thus far we seem to be doing well, and we have Brothers coming forward asking to get involved. We have a LEO committee, which is engaging many of the Brothers in research and presentation of papers. We also have a new membership enrichment committee, headed by Jason Crespino and Dave Roussopolous, and it is moving along nicely.

* We have a new scholarship this year for worthy ROTC candidates at the University of St. Thomas. The requirements for this scholarship are that the candidate exhibit a strong balance between body, mind and spirit. The administration of the ROTC program is REALLY very excited about this.

FROM THE SOUTH

Masonic Light?

I come across interesting bits of information every so often. The facts range from bizarre to mundane, but they always make me think and sometimes they challenge my beliefs about the world. Consider these facts: Reno, Nevada is actually farther west than Los Angeles, California. Calvin Coolidge is the only U.S. President born on the 4th of July, but three Presidents, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, and James Monroe, died on Independence Day. Adams and Jefferson actually died on the same day: July 4, 1826. In Omyakon, Russia, the record high temperature for the month of January is 2 degrees Fahrenheit. That's the record high folks...the warmest it's ever been there in recorded history for the entire month. The daily mean January temperature for the same locale is 51 degrees below zero. What important event took place in the American colonies on September 5th, 1752? Nothing: the day never existed. When the British Empire switched from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar, it was necessary to skip ahead 11 days to bring the realm into line with everyone else using the calendar. Thus, Wednesday September 2nd, 1752 was followed by Thursday September 14th, 1752. Although the words to the "Star-Spangled Banner" came from a poem by Francis Scott Key, the music itself came from a British song called "To Anacreon in Heaven". The shapes of our numbers (1, 2, 3, etc.) came from Arabic and are formally called, not surprisingly, Arabic numerals. Interestingly, modern Arabic uses numbers it borrowed from scripts in India. Finally, our dear letter G, the seventh letter of the Latin alphabet, was reported by Plutarch to have been invented by a Roman named Spurius Carvilius Ruga, who supposedly wanted to distinguish the different sounds then represented by the Latin letter C. How accurate was Plutarch? The modern English equivalent of the word spurious means "not authentic or true". Who can say?

The reason I bring these random, unconnected bits of trivia up is because I'm always amazed by what I pick up without really doing anything. The true amazement, however, comes from what I learn from even a small increase in effort. This is especially true of the effort I expend in coming to Lodge. I always learn something new every time I hear a lecture or watch some part of the ritual or even engage a fellow Brother in conversation. The lessons our Craft tries to impart are numerous and difficult to grasp at a single setting and our brethren have a vast array of experiences to share. It's much better to come back again and again. So come on down and, as, Tom Bodett used to say, "We'll leave the light on for you."

LODGE EDUCATION OFFICER

This the conclusion of WB Ed Halpaus' article from the April issue. This month we read correspondence between our two esteemed Brothers, George Washington and Benjamin Franklin.

(The data below is from WB Ed Halpaus' weekly column "Mehr Licht! More Light!" for February 24, 2011. WB Ed is the Grand Lodge Educational Officer and publishes this column on a weekly basis. While Washington's Birthday is past, it may be profitable for us to consider once again the impact of these two eminent brothers. – Barnes A. Sharitt, Jr.)

Rather than write something new about him here, (as if one could,) I would like to share something with you that I have in a rare book. [2] These are letters from Brother Benjamin Franklin to Brother George Washington and Brother Washington's letter in return to Brother Franklin.

These letters demonstrate the affection these two Masons had for each other, as well as the patriotism both had for their country. The United States owes a lot to these two men, and as Masons we can all be proud of all they did for freedom.

To: George Washington from Benjamin Franklin. Philadelphia, 16 September, 1789.

"Dear Sir;

My malady renders my sitting up to write rather painful to me; but I cannot let my son-in-law, Mr. Bache, part for New York, without congratulating you by him on the recovery of your health, so precious to us all, and on the growing strength of our new government under your administration. For my own personal ease, I should have died two years ago; though those years have been spent in excruciating pain, I am pleased that I have lived them, since they have brought me to see our present situation. I am now finishing my eighty-fourth year, and probably with it my career in this life; but in whatever state of existence I am placed in hereafter, if I retain any memory of what has passed here, I shall with it retain the esteem, respect, and affection, with which I have long been, my dear friend, yours most sincerely.

B. Franklin."

From George Washington to Benjamin Franklin. New York, 23 September, 1789.

"Dear Sir,

The affectionate congratulations on the recovery of my health, and the warm expressions of personal friendship, which were contained in your letter of the 16th instant, claim my gratitude. And the consideration, that it was written when

you were afflicted with a painful malady, greatly increases my obligation for it.

Would to God, my dear Sir, that I could congratulate you upon the removal of that excruciating pain, under which you labor, and that your existence might close with as much ease to yourself, as its continuance has been beneficial to our country and useful to mankind; or, if the united wishes of a free people, joined with the earnest prayers of every friend to science and humanity, could relieve the body from pains or infirmities, that you could claim an exemption on this score. But this cannot be, and you have within yourself the only resource to which we can confidently apply for relief, a philosophic mind.

If to be venerated for benevolence, if to be admired for talents, if to be esteemed for patriotism, if to be beloved for philanthropy, can gratify the human mind, you must have the pleasing consolation to know, that you have not lived in vain. And I flatter myself that it will not be ranked among the least grateful occurrences of your life to be assured, that, so long as I retain my memory, you will be recollected with respect, veneration, and affection by your sincere friend,

George Washington.”

More than just a few years ago--when my children were quite young—we, as parents decided that it would be good to establish some values about giving to others. It was the Holiday Season, and as our children were the only two grandchildren on both sides of the family, it would not be ridiculous to say they were overindulged a bit. My wife and I decided we would “adopt a family” to help someone else have a better little better Holiday Season.

A charity was contacted, and soon our family was selected for us. Interestingly enough, this family included a single mom, a boy about our son’s age, and a little girl, also in the same age bracket. The charity gave us the Mom’s and the kids’ first names, and their wish lists. We made it a family event. Each child shopped for gifts for the other child. It was amazing watching our children select with care gifts you would have thought were going to their best friends. Linda and I found things for the mother that were also helpful to us at the time, Back then, gift cards for food didn’t exist, so you carefully planned out the meal and purchased it the day of delivery. That holiday was pretty remarkable. The children enjoyed the adventure of helping others and hopefully learning a small lesson besides. I remember that Holiday morning as my own children sat among the cornucopia of gifts, when my youngest asked, “Do you think they liked their presents?” Well, we would probably never know, but all had a good hunch they did.

Later that week, we were watching the news when a tragic story about a family on the west side whose home had burned .One of the children was severely burned; the other had lost his life, As they showed the scene of fire, you could see the remnants of Christmas gifts strewn about the yard by the Fire Department. Just then, we spotted the Tiny Tikes toy my daughter had so carefully picked out for her “adopted sister” The more we looked and took inventory, the more we knew without asking this was our family. The emotions we felt that day and for the weeks that followed were heart-wrenching. We quietly behind-the-scenes helped this family by raising some money and getting it into their hands anonymously.

I think each of us that year received one of the greatest gifts we ever could have received, although the event
