To Travel into Foreign Countries

For the past several years, I've had the good fortune to have been involved in the Ambassador Committee. "Committee" may be too formal a title for it. It was really

just one or two of us (mostly Brother Keith Reiersen) that wanted to visit other Lodges. It grew into something a little more, but the desire to travel was the same. For my part, I just wanted to meet other Masons and get to know them better and to share in the common bond that brings us all together.

My basic assumption was that Masons the world over are pretty much the same: we all share the same commitment to seeking further light and making ourselves better. While I found that this basic assumption is true, I also found that we, as Masons, are also very different. Our Lodges have different strengths and weaknesses. We have different kinds of buildings that we hold our Stated Communications in (some are historic, some are modern). We emphasize different aspects of our work (some promote ritual, some promote fellowship). Even the particular day of the month on which we meet can result in interesting twists: we visited one Lodge that only holds Stated Communications on evenings of the full moon. Sometimes even Lodges that occupy the same building can give you a vastly different experience.

I've met a good number of Masons through these Lodge visitations and learned quite a bit about other Lodges. But I've also learned a great deal about myself and my own Lodge in the process. We have a lot to be proud of at Ancient Landmark #5, but we could also do some things better. To each of you who have the opportunity to visit another Lodge, I highly recommend you take it. Join the Ambassador Committee and help organize a visit. Make connections with some of our Brethren around the state. Even if there are no visitations planned, go on your own. The Sublime Degree

Below is something you're likely to find interesting. There has long been a friendly debate about the terms, Sublime Degree of a Master Mason, and Sublime Degree of Master Mason. The following does not settle the discussion, but it does provide some useful knowledge of the degree, and also something to think about. It comes from "Freemasons' Guide and Compendium;" a very good book to have for Masonic learning.

The Sublime Degree of a Master Mason

It is believed that the phrase "the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason" first occurs, in the year 1754, in a certificate drawn up by the Grand Lodge of Ireland, relating to a lodge at Lurgan, No. 134, Irish constitution, and that it was used by another Irish lodge, that of the Royal Scots, No. 11, in 1762.

In England the phrase was used in 1767 by the Lodge of Friendship No. 6, but did not come into general use in lodges under the Premier Grand Lodge until near the end of the eighteenth century; but where we do find it, there we also find as a rule evidence of the 'Antients' influence. In 1760 Thomas Dunckerley, as Master of a lodge held aboard the Vanguard, signed a certificate (the original is in Quebec, a photograph of it in Grand Lodge Library) to the effect that a Fellow Craft "having sustasin'd with Strength, Firmness, and Courage, the most Painful Forks, and Severest Tryalls, we gave unto him the most Sublime Degree of Master."

In Bristol in 1768 a lodge, founded and erased all within the twelve months, gloried in the name of the Sun Lodge of Perpetual Friendship, No. 421, and in the July of its short life its minutes refer to the Sublime of a Master Mason, and, in the month following, to the Sublime degree of a Royal Arch Mason. The St John's Lodge of Henley-in-Arden, which had a few years of existence beginning in 1791, at one time called the Master Mason's Degree 'honourable,' or 'respectable.'

THE SECRETARY'S DESK

It was just about this time a dozen years ago when I was sitting down with my Dad and helping him with the mundane task of mail and bills. Parkinson's had ravaged his body, making it difficult for even walking, let alone opening mail and writing out checks. The disease had taken away the active man that taught me many things, including the finer points of pheasant hunting and fly fishing. Ah, but the mind was sharp as a tack. He could tell you within a few thousand dollars his portfolios' values at any given time. As we were going through that pile of mail, I came across a letter from his Royal Arch Lodge back in Mountain Home. It was a letter to the membership to advise that they may need to close the Lodge as they were in debt and without much hope. They had included a balance sheet for the Lodge. It wasn't all that bad; yes they needed an influx of cash to get things rolling again and to clear their debt, but over all, not bad. I gave the documents to my Dad and asked, "what do you think?" We looked at each other trying to come up with a solution to help them out. Dad looked me and said, "you know your Mom would never have approved of what we are thinking. Are you ok with it?" I laughed and my response was quick: "Hell, Dad you know that when you die I will just take what's left and waste it on some fancy shotgun and a trip somewhere to use it." We both agreed that sending a check to the Lodge just might be a better use of the dollars. I had to write it out, and he signed the best he could. He dictated a letter to me which challenged that Lodge to look to the future and move forward. Dad was far from careless when it came to money. Over years he had accumulated a worthwhile estate and set up a much needed trust to care for my sister. This was just one more thing he could do to help others. My dad didn't see Thanksgiving that year, passing just a few days before his favorite holiday.

The other day I was cleaning out some of my old tax records and came across several lost items I had been searching for years. One was a sympathy card and letter from the Past High Priest of RAM #24 with his condolences. In it, to my surprise, was my Dad's Life Membership card. They had granted it to him for his service and financial support. That letter also included a statement that probably started my journey into Masonry. "Doug I am not clear if you are a Brother Mason. If you are not, you should be!" The other letter was from his good friend Sam who I discovered just a couple years ago was the Past Grand High Priest of Idaho.

So far as Scotland is concerned, we learn that in the eighteenth century the Third Degree was usually denominated the "High Degree of a Master Mason," but in Lodge Holyrood House, according to R. S. Lindsay's history of the lodge, the degree had among its various designations, between 1776 and 1778, the "Honourable Degree," the "High and Honourable Degree," the "Noble and Honourable Degree," the "Stupendous Degree" (of a Master Mason).

Reference has just been made to a 'respectable' degree. More than one lodge applied to the Third Degree, as also to Master Masons, that old-fashioned adjective, so peculiarly Masonic, so commonly misunderstood. The Candidate is early advised to dedicate himself to such pursuits as may enable him to be 'respectable' in life—that is, he should so comport himself as to earn the esteem and regard of those who 'look upon' him, that being the original meaning of the word 'respect' and the meaning borne by it at the time when the word 'respectable' was brought into the ritual.
